Message from the Minister



Most of us are familiar with the Christmas carol, "Good King Wenceslas". It's a song that tells a story about a Bohemian king (modern day Czech Republic), Wenceslaus I, who ruled in the 10th century.

Wenceslaus, also known as Vaclav the Good, was born around 907 and was the Duke of Bohemia from 921 until his assassination in 935. Though he died young, his

He built numerous churches in Bohemia and was deeply respected as a pious, moral, educated, and intelligent man who promoted the Christian faith and took care of the poor, the sick, the widowed, and the orphaned by doing charitable deeds. He is considered a martyr and a saint in the Czech Republic and is the patron saint of the country.

The carol was translated from a Czech poem by John Mason Neale and published in 1853. The lyrics were then set to a thirteenth century tune.

The lyrics of "Good King Wenceslas" describe the king's compassionate act on St. Stephen's Day (26th December). According to the legend, Wenceslaus braved harsh winter weather to provide gifts for a poor peasant. The carol portrays the king and his page walking through the snow to deliver food, fuel, and wine to the peasant's dwelling.

The last four lines bring this challenge and assurance

"Therefore, Christian men, be sure, Wealth or rank possessing, Ye who now will bless the poor, Shall yourselves find blessing."

Thank you to all who give so generously, not just at Christmas, but throughout the year. Your generosity is evident in so many ways, be that special appeals, such as the Turkey/Syria earthquake appeal earlier in 2023, or the ongoing appeals for Storehouse, the International Meeting Point and many, many more.

Unlike Wenceslaus, your generosity may not have a poem or carol written about it but let us always remember what Jesus, the one whose birth we celebrate, taught. In the gospel of Matthew, in chapter 25, Jesus teaches that whenever we give food to the hungry, water to the thirsty, shelter to those without homes, clothes to those who have nothing, care to those who are ill or wrongfully imprisoned, when we do this we are doing it for the Lord Jesus.



A BRIEF UPDATE ON THE REFURBISHMENT CONTRACT.

INTRODUCTION

In my last article for the Autumn Edition of the Eagle Wing, I mentioned that because it was written in mid-August 2023, that you would notice quite a difference in the work related to the Refurbishment Contract by the time you were reading it, and this proved to be the case.

A considerable amount of work has been undertaken over recent months and despite the extremely poor weather during October and November, at the time of writing this article, the Contract is both on Programme and on Budget.

However, the extensive glazing for the windows and doors, will not be available to install until mid-December and this might well result in an overall delay.

THE HEATING

During September the new gas boiler was installed and following that all the associated heating pipes were then taken from the boiler house, through various stores and fixed to the walls of the Main Hall and the Irwin Room and Archie Agnew Hall and also connected into the newly refurbished areas. There are now numerous heating pipes, because the new system provides independent heating to every hall, or room, within our accommodation and this is a vast improvement to our previous arrangement, where if you required heat in a particular hall, other unoccupied halls had also to be heated. The heating was up and running from the beginning of October and we would thank the various organisations who agreed to delaying their usual September start to allow this work to be completed.

The electrical work has also progressed very well and the first-fix has been completed and soon the second phase of this work will start.

THE MAIN CONTRACTOR, THE SUBCONTRACTORS & THE DESIGN TEAM

Our Main Contractor DA Wishart has been great to work with and nothing seems to be a bother to them and they have a very good foreman on site called Davy Graham, who is on top of everything and is a very skilled workman.

The various Subcontractors have all worked well together, which is not always easy on a confined site.

Judith Hamilton, our Architect, has really been superb and knows about everything that is going on and she chairs the monthly site meetings and prepares comprehensive minutes.

The remainder of the Design Team, consisting the Mechanical & Electrical Consultants, the Structural Engineers and the Quantity Surveyor have all carried out their various tasks to a high standard.

OTHER RELEVANT MATTERS

A meeting has been planned for the end of November to discuss and agree the finer details of the Coffee Bar and especially the curved Servery Area, which will include a fridge, a dish washer, several shelves and drawer units, a sink, a hand rinse and two water boilers. In addition, the fittings and fixtures, together with the finishes and overall colour scheme will be decided and Elaine Nixon-Shepherd and Ann Williams will join me at this meeting with Judith.

We have discovered several problems with the original building construction completed in 1978, especially in the old Coffee Bar, with badly rusted steelwork and also that the base plates to the two steel posts, which supported the overhead beam, above the old window, were sitting a couple of feet above floor level and spanned across the cavity in the lower wall, resulting in inadequate and improper base support. We are so fortunate that this significant, previously hidden, defect was discovered and also that we weren't planning to use any of these old structures in the Refurbishment. As I mentioned in my Autumn article, if these serious structural defects hadn't been detected, we would have incurred considerable expenditure in sorting them out.

In addition, we also have discovered, when the underground drainage was being investigated, that some runs of pipework were not laid in the proper direction, and I am very surprised that this hasn't caused blockage problems to date. New pipework has been installed to correct this existing problem.

THANKS FOR YOUR PATIENCE & UNDERSTANDING

Finally, just a word of thanks for your patience and understanding of the situation during the course of the contract and also for complying with the various necessary changes, which will need to be in place until the end of April 2024.
