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Buddy Holly, born Charles Hardin Holley on September 7, 1936, was an American musician, singer, and songwriter whose influence on rock and roll is legendary. Growing up in Lubbock, Texas, Holly developed a love for music early on, inspired by both country and rhythm and blues. He rose to fame in the mid-1950s with his band, The Crickets, producing a string of hits that included "That'll Be the Day" and "Peggy Sue." Holly's style, characterized by his signature glasses, innovative guitar playing, and distinct voice, became iconic. Tragically, his life was cut short in a plane 9, a day remembered as "The Day the Music Died."

One of Buddy Holly's posthumously released songs in 1959, "Raining in My Heart," beautifully encapsulates feelings of sadness despite outward appearances of calm and beauty. The lyrics express this contrast in a simple yet powerful way:

The sun is out - the sky is blue There's not a cloud to spoil the view But it's raining - raining in my heart.

The song strikes a chord because it captures a universal human experience. Lots of people walk through life with their own invisible burdens. Like the lyrics describe, on the outside, everything may seem fine — the sun is shining, and the sky is clear. But internally, they are struggling with emotional, physical, or spiritual challenges that make it feel like it's "raining in their hearts."

For those facing such struggles, comfort and hope can be hard to find. However, it was Jesus who said, "Come to me, all you who are weary and carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest." This is part of the hope which the Lord Jesus offers to all. Amidst the trials that we meet, when facing anguish that few if any know about, God knows and he cares. Sometimes when in such situations we can pray but our prayers feel like they are going no higher than the ceiling. Be assured, God hears because he has shown he loves us in his son Jesus Christ. Through prayer, we reach out to a God who understands our pain, who is present in the storms we face.

A passage of Scripture that I personally return to again and again, for myself and to share with others, is Psalm 34:18, which offers this message of hope:

"The Lord is close to the broken-hearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit."

This verse is a reminder that, for those who are hurting, God is near. It reassures us that even in moments when life feels overwhelming, we are not alone. God cares deeply about those who feel broken, offering comfort and healing to those who seek him. While life may sometimes feel like it's raining in our hearts, God assures us that he is with us to sustain us and in Christ Jesus he will never leave us nor forsake us.

May you know Gods sustaining grace and blessing.


Each Sunday morning the children love to share their stories and participate enthusiastically, even if they are a little quiet sometimes when they come back down into church.

The official opening of our newly refurbished Walter Nelson Hall Complex took place on the last weekend of June 2024. The most notable improvements are the new entrance foyer, central lobby (with new toilet facilities) and 'The Hub' which overlooks Groomsport harbour and Cockle Row cottages.

The weekend of celebration began with a community day on Saturday followed on Sunday by a Service of Dedication and Congregational Lunch.

The Saturday certainly had a party atmosphere with balloons and music to liven the day. Everyone from the congregation and surrounding community was invited into the new 'Hub' to enjoy tea/coffee, scones and tray-bakes. 












RNLI Buckingham Palace Garden Party marks 200 years of the RNLI

2024 marks the 200th anniversary of the founding of the RNLI. For a period in excess of a quarter of that time Edna Robinson has been helping fundraise and


has supported the Crew of Donaghadee Lifeboat Station and the RNLI in the UK generally.

We have a number of plans for the Autumn which allow us to reach out within our own community and beyond. We would welcome your support for any or all of these outreach opportunities.

<u>20th September</u> is the date of the second meeting of the **Men's group** at which we hope to collect tools for re use in Tanzania, under the auspices of the Belfast based organisation, Tools for Solidarity.

We hope to support the Samaritan's Purse Christmas Box Appeal again, with boxes becoming available in <u>late September</u>.

19th October is our next scheduled event, an afternoon tea during which we will hear from Rev Derek Kerr about his experiences as an enthusiast for the Royal Family. All money raised will be given to support the work of Open Doors with their work among persecuted Christians in the world. Tickets will be available from members of the Mission Committee. Numbers will be limited by the space available.

<u>9th November</u> is the date of a **coffee morning** with the proceeds going to Rev John Angle for support of staff at the Christian School in Gaza.

<u>29th November</u> is the occasion on which we hope to welcome back the **Fortwilliam Music Society** for a concert in the church halls. The money raised will be given for the work of Stephen and Angelina Cowan in Kenya. By that time we will have heard details of their current projects because they have been invited to speak in church on 27th October.

Linda Norgrove Foundation



Linda Norgrove devoted her working life to helping others. She travelled many miles from the Isle of Lewis in Scotland to remote parts of Afghanistan to work as aid worker. There she oversaw projects designed to create jobs and small businesses in unstable and vulnerable areas. She built up a strong relationship with the local community and was greatly admired for her work with women and children.

Sadly, Linda was kidnapped by the Taliban in Kunar on 26 September 2010 and died in a failed rescue attempt on 8 October. She was only 36.

The Linda Norgrove Foundation was established by her parents in October 2010 in memory of Linda. The Foundation's primary goal is to help women and children in Afghanistan, the innocent victims of the decades of conflict in the poorest country in the world outside Africa.



It is tempting to forget about the troubles of Afghanistan but recent reports on the BBC reminded us of the severe oppression of women by the Taliban and the plight of millions of starving children, exacerbated by the ineptitude of the Taliban authorities. Education for women has been almost completely stopped and their voices are not allowed to be heard in public.

Midwifery is currently the only subject women are still allowed to study at local colleges and the foundation has funded 20 residential places for women to study at the Sheefa Midwifery Institute in northern Afghanistan. A trusted resident German volunteer oversees the programme for them.

Following the 'suspension' of higher education for women, the foundation is no longer able to provide scholarships. After women were banned from higher education, not only were the students confined to their home and deprived of the chance of a medical career, many feared their lives were in danger and lived in fear of the Taliban.

In August 2024, after clearing many hurdles and with the support of the UK government, the foundation succeeded in bringing 19 medical students to Scotland to continue their studies. It is humbling to hear what some of them had to endure.



Fariba was inspired to become a doctor after both her mother and brother became ill and could not be treated in Afghanistan. She was in the final stage of her medical studies in Kabul when the Taliban banned most women's education. Having taken part in a women's demonstration she was being hunted by the Taliban, who visited her home and threatened her so she had to move several times. She was scared and isolated and became depressed. However today she says "I feel like God has granted me a miracle in life, and I am soaring towards my goals and dreams, smiling and happy every second"

The trustees of the foundation include Linda's parents. None of the trustees are paid or receive expenses. This ensures that the charity's funds are devoted entirely to its aims.

On Sunday 17th November, here in Groomsport, we are delighted to have another evening praise service led by the Donaghadee Community Choir. This year we would like to devote the collection to the Linda Norgrove Foundation, and we would encourage everyone to come along and support this. Ebenezer Joins the Celebration

It was tea and traybakes on Saturday 29th June at our Community Open Day as we celebrated the church hall being refurbished. Everyone involved is to be congratulated on a splendid occasion.

At the event one or two people suggested I might pick up the old pen again and write a wee story for the church magazine. Naturally I felt flattered that my previous ramblings, stretching back over a decade, had been remembered. Hence I was easy prey to the persuaders. Sated by tea and buns, I was foolish



enough to promise, well, maybe a half promise, that I would make an effort for the next edition.

Call it Divine intervention but, as Wilma and I left the hall, we bumped into my potential story in the street. He rejoiced in the name Ebenezer Savage. Now I just love unusual names. My favourite until I met Ebenezer was Finbarr Flood. The name could have come straight from the pages of James Joyce's novel, "Dubliners". Back in the day before computers and mobile phones, Dubliner Finbarr spent a season in the Irish League as a goalkeeper. He later became Managing Director of Guinness Ireland. On reflection, I suspect he may have been supping some of the black stuff going by some of his performances! Sorry Finbarr, only joking.

Now, one thing I do enjoy doing is making connections, as I have just demonstrated, so let's return swiftly to our newfound friend, Ebenezer. Within minutes of meeting Ebenezer for the first time, his unsolicited life story was spread out in front of us. We were told he was born in Groomsport almost ninety years ago and had lived at The Hill. He told us that the building we know today as The Walter Nelson Hall was named after a former minister and indeed the Rev Nelson baptised our former Clerk of Session, Elaine Nixon Shepherd.

Ebenezer pointed out that the church hall we had just left was originally the village school at which he had been a pupil. When it ceased being a school I'm not sure but, of course, it was subsequently transformed into the building we know today as the Walter Nelson Hall.

My research tells me that the original school behind the church had been built by the Rev Isaac Mack for the education of the children of the village and district. Isaac was the first minister of the newly formed Presbyterian congregation of Groomsport. On 18th May 1841 his Ordination took place in a large marquee on the shore side of Main Street, in an area known as Holme Field, now a public park.

The industrious and enthusiastic Rev Mack raised the necessary funds for the building of the church. About two years later, in 1843, the church was built and opened for worship. Previously, the Sunday services were held in a house at 17 Main Street.

Rev Mack built for himself the splendid house just outside the village on the left of the road from Bangor. It was the residence in which he lived and died, and later became the Rectory of the Church of Ireland. Originally called 'Albertville' after Queen Victoria's husband, it is now known as 'The Old Rectory'.

Now, let's look a little more closely at the name 'Ebenezer'. I have never heard of anyone called 'Ebenezer', have you? I guess I have left myself open to protestations from any Ebenezer out there but, in truth, the only person I know going by the name Ebenezer is the villain from the Charles Dickens novel 'A Christmas Carol', the odious Ebenezer Scrooge, booo, and all his negative connotations.

I have always thought that Ebenezer is a name of someone from the Bible. Not so! Ebenezer is a stone marking a particular place! It is first mentioned at 1 Samuel 4 (1): "The Israelites camped at Ebenezer..." and at 1 Samuel 7:14: "Then Samuel took a stone and set it up between Mizpah and Shen. He named it 'Ebenezer' saying "this day the Lord has helped us". Undoubtedly, the stone was used by Samuel to celebrate a victory by the Israelites over the Philistines. It was meant to be a solid reminder of the Lord's power and protection.

Now Samuel happens to be one of my favourite Old Testament characters, prophet, priest, military leader and king maker to whom the Lord spoke. Remember the sage advice the old priest of Shiloh, Eli, gave Samuel namely that if the Lord spoke to him again he should reply: "Speak Lord; for Thy servant heareth."

Do we hear when the Lord speaks to us? Do we listen? Gosh, I don't mean to preach so I'll blame it fairly and squarely on the Samuel effect.

It is my guess Dickens read his Bible and used the name 'Ebenezer' to show that the nasty Mr Scrooge had a heart of stone. At the end of his novel Dickens transforms Scrooge from being a miserly character into a rather more lovable one. I wonder if he meant it to be a case of Divine transformation?

Our Ebenezer, the chap we met outside the church hall, loves nothing better at the weekend than to travel around the Ards Peninsula in his car, visiting favourite haunts of his childhood, particularly Groomsport. He gave us this photograph of the village, circa 1900. To the top right you will see the church and to the bottom left is a wall, the frontage of the old school, now the church hall.

Before we left the scene, Wilma ushered Ebenezer into the hall to see how his former school had changed and have a refreshing cuppa and a wee



bun! Did I mention his surname, Savage? Other than to say that Savage has Anglo-Norman origins, I think it prudent to leave this particular connection for another day and to thank Ebenezer for his inspiration for the story

I do hope you have enjoyed this yarn. In some masochistic way I have had pleasure in putting it together.

Upon reading my story, Julie, our church secretary, was delighted to inform me that my Ebenezer is also her friend. She met him some months ago in the village and now he calls with her every Wednesday morning before having lunch in the restaurant next door. He also visits some old friends at The Hill and has a vast collection of postcards of which this Groomsport snap is but one.

The Lighthouse School in Gaza

We are delighted that once again we are having a coffee morning in aid of the Hope Christian Trust for their work in Gaza and the West Bank.

It will be on Saturday 9th November, from 10.00am to 12.00 Noon, as usual.

Everyone has heard so much in the news about the situation in Gaza and the West Bank, and I would just like to update you on the current picture as it involves the Trust.

The Trust have raised funds for the upkeep of the school, its staff and its families. As far as is known all the staff are alive, some have escaped to Egypt, Jordan and Australia. However, two of the students have been killed and, it is thought there may be many more.

What The Trust is trying to do......

- 1. Praying constantly for Gaza and its people, for their safety and for this to finish and peace to reign.
- 2. Getting financial help to all the staff.
- 3. The school building and grounds are being cared for, along with 'gate keepers' and gardeners. The solar panels and batteries are being used to supply electricity to the local Orthodox compound and neighbourhood.
- 4. Funds are being obtained to supply and distribute food parcels. The kindergarten buildings of Al Minara are now the storage and distribution hub for this programme and is being run by trusted friends of the Trust and the school.

The Future ... The two church compounds (RC and Orthodox), the Christian Lighthouse School and the adjacent Ahli (Anglican) hospital have been damaged but are in relatively good repair.

Some of the staff will stay in Gaza and there will also be a somewhat depleted but none the less strong Christian community.

They will need our help. When a ceasefire happens, the plan is to get into Gaza, evaluate the situation with the local community, seek a ceasefire financial support, repair the school, seek staff and open the school again.

In the north of the West Bank there is the Family Centre in Zababdah which is only six miles away from Jenin, an area heavily bombarded by the Israeli army. This centre, which is linked to the Anglican Church was supposed to be opening a guesthouse this summer with the aim of providing more financial support for the centre. This, of course was impossible so again it produces a financial difficulty.

On 9th November while we are having our coffee morning John Angle of The Trust hopes to be in the West Bank. Please do support us if you possibly can.

(At our recent lunch for the refugees there were 2 men from Gaza. I mentioned the Lighthouse School, got no response, so ..it was only when I realised and gave the Arabaic name of Al Minara that their faces lit up and we were able to talk about it.)



So far we have only heard of the death of two children from the school, Leila in the picture above is sadly one of them.

We know the catchment area of the school, Zeitun,

has been hard hit.

This reminds us how savage this war is.

Ministry in Amsterdam by Rev. Denis Campbell

Hilary and I arrived in the Dutch capital at the beginning of August. It was to be my fourth spell as locum minister of the English Reformed Church.

We were welcomed as familiar old friends. There has been a long vacancy because no Church of Scotland church was allowed to call a minister for two years due to restructuring. This was followed by the lengthy process of appointing a new minister.

The congregation is cosmopolitan. There are a few Scots but mainly English, Canadians, Americans, Africans, Italians and Germans. Around fifty per cent are Dutch because English is widely spoken in the Netherlands. There are many political and theological views but as Christians they respect one another and worship joyfully together.

Each Sunday there is a liturgy sheet with congregational responses. Music tends to be more 'classical' with a robed choir and often professional musicians from the congregation taking part. Of course like us they all love the children's sermon and one Sunday I took the opportunity to tell them the story of the Eagle Wing.

Pastoral work involved travelling all over Amsterdam. We walked along the canals, took trams to every corner of the city and trains to members who lived further away. I was happy when my Pastoral Assistant and his wife from Groomsport arrived for a few days!

The manse is by the Museumplein, right behind the Concertgebouw. This meant that all the riches of music and art were on our doorstep. We attended many classical concerts and also enjoyed travelling back to our youth with Paul and Catherine to hear the Bootleg Beatles. Multiple visits were made to the Rembrandts and Vermeers in the Rijksmuseum and to the sunflowers and cornfields in the Van Gogh Museum.

Another detail about the English Reformed Church (dating from 1607) which you may find interesting is that the pulpit lectern was gifted by William of Orange in 1689 and bears the William and Mary monogram.

This was probably our last spell of ministry among the canals. A permanent pastor will arrive this autumn for what we hope will be a long and fruitful ministry. Hilary and I have been so enriched by the experience of serving in Amsterdam.
